NEWS

Dr Jennie Henley will be joining the Research Reference Group in January 2018. Jennie is currently the Area Leader in Music Education at the Royal College of Music and brings with her expertise in community music and the ways that teachers work inclusively within different contexts.

The Commission is grateful to Professor Susan Hallam and Susanne Burns for sharing their unpublished literature review on 'Progression in instrumental music learning for learners from disadvantaged communities' (ACE & Opera North, forthcoming), which has provided an invaluable foundation for the Commission's research programme.

We have been talking to Panel member Hasan Bakhshi, Executive Director of Creative Economy at Nesta, about how we can use large-scale data to inform the Commission's research.

The Commission was discussed on BBC Radio 3's <u>Music Matters</u> show, hosted by Tom Service. Lincoln was interviewed alongside Diane Widdison (Musician's Union) and Fiona Harvey (ABO) in a conversation about how children progress in their music learning.

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In October, the Commission presented its aims to the Music Education Advisory Council, chaired by Professor Linda Merrick (Principal of the Royal Northern College of Music).

Lincoln and Emily met with Suzy Klein at the BBC to discuss her involvement in the Commission Panel and her wealth of experience in the music industry as a writer and broadcaster.

RESEARCH

With the research programme now underway, the ABRSM team is collaborating with the Research Reference Group to gather the literature and evidence needed to investigate the Commission's aims in more detail. Over the next 12 months, this will involve the following:

Secondary Research – drawing on the latest scholarly and cultural literature in the area of progress and progression in learning, as well as large-scale data.

Primary Research – 'on the ground' discussions, focus groups, observations and interviews with learners, parents, teachers, schools, music services and cultural organisations.

Public Consultation – Opening in January 2018, this will be a series of questions and an online survey, available via our website, inviting responses from those across the sector.
