PANEL MEETING 2

29 January | Roundhouse | London

Nick Kenyon hosted the second Panel meeting at the Roundhouse in Camden, where he was joined by Marcus Davey (CEO and Artistic Director) who gave an inspiring introduction to the many initiatives supporting progress and progression within his organisation.

Following an update on the research programme, the Commissioners were invited to review a series of thematic areas in focus groups and debate the priorities for the Commission going forward.

NEWS

20 March | Music Education Council seminar | London

The Commission is working with MEC to host their Spring seminar, 'Whose Curriculum? Seizing the Initiative', where we will run a stakeholder focus group asking for members to directly contribute evidence to the Commission's research programme.

7 February | Music Mark Member's Meeting | London

Lincoln Abbotts and Nerissa Taysom gave a short presentation at City Hall about the Commission and its research programme to heads of London music services, inviting them to take part in the upcoming public consultation.

RESEARCH UPDATES

We have continued to expand our research team. We're delighted that Professor Martin Fautley (Birmingham City University) and Professor Susan Hallam (Institute of Education) have agreed to join us.

2018 has got off to a swift start for the research team, who met on 5 January to finalise the research design and methods. The research programme will generate information and evidence in order to assist the Commission Panel to consider their overall question. There are three research questions that the programme will now consider:

- 1. What are the current opportunities and barriers for supporting progress in engagement with music?
- 2. What do different stakeholder groups see as the priorities for supporting progress in the current educational climate?
- 3. How do other subjects conceptualise progress and progression, what mechanisms do they have for supporting progress and what models of practice can be applied to music?

Our methods for gathering evidence and public opinion are:

- A multi-modal survey to be launched on 5 March.
- Stakeholder focus groups, who will be tasked with debating some of the issues and writing a collaborative statement to answer the Commission's overall question.
- A literature review, which will be published alongside the Commission's final report in November 2018.

I February | Help Musicians UK | Glasgow
